1. The River Thames is 215 miles (346km) long, the longest river that flows wholly in England.

2. The river rises at Thames Head in Gloucestershire, 3 miles from Cirencester and is marked by a stone inscribed:

The Conservators of the River Thames 1817 – 1974
This stone was placed here to mark the source of the River Thames

There's a little cup in the Cotswold Hills

- 3. The river is tidal up to Teddington.
- 4. The river flows through 45 locks from Lechlade to Teddington where it is at sea level and becomes tidal.
- 5. The river passes through or provides a boundary of 9 counties. (Gloucestershire, Wiltshire, Oxfordshire, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Middlesex, Surrey, Essex, Kent)
- 6. The river curves and winds on its path to the sea. There is only one straight section of 1 mile length suitable for rowing races and that is at Henley.
- 7. The last road bridge to be built is the Queen Elizabeth II Bridge at Dartford opened in 1991. It is 9,423ft (2,872m) long with a central span of 1,476ft (450m).
- 8. The Thames Barrier spanning 1,716 ft (523m) was built across the river at Woolwich in 1982 as a flood defence for London.
- 9. The entrance to the Tower of London from the river is called Traitor's Gate. Prisoners brought to the tower entered through this gate never to return.
- 10. The annual University Boat Race between Oxford and Cambridge ends just downstream from Chiswick Bridge. It is marked by a stone marked UBR on the Surrey bank and a blue and black marker on the Middlesex side.

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
